SPIRITUAL GROWTH

THE MOST EFFECTIVE PRACTICE FOR FOSTERING SPIRITUAL GROWTH

IS ENGAGEMENT WITH SCRIPTURES

Research has shown that reading the Bible is the most effective spiritual practice.

"Transform Your Congregation: Read the Bible" shares how individuals, groups, or congregations can develop intentional reading and reflecting on scripture.

There are some researchers who have studied spiritual practices and vitality at hundreds of congregations of all denominations, beginning with the Willow Creek Church. As it turns out, church programs have almost no impact on spiritual growth. Instead, the survey paints a remarkably consistent picture of something entirely different.

The research identified stages of spiritual growth, ranging from seeker ("exploring Christ") to fully Christ centered. Study of the data also revealed the key catalysts for advancing from one stage to the next. The most effective practice for fostering spiritual growth is engagement with scriptures.

To be sure, the Bible Challenge isn't the only way to engage with the vast sweep of the scriptural story. There are other read-the-Bible in a year plans. One can pray the daily office (for convenience, using the Forward Movement prayer website or our iPhone app). If you decide to try out the Bible Challenge, Forward Movement has published a companion book of essays to go with each day's reading, with contributions by clergy, lay leaders, and scholars from around the Anglican Communion. Among the contributors is Bishop Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury.

However you decide to read the Bible, I think you'll find that it will change your life. If your congregation can find a way to do this, amazing things will happen in your church. Really. I've seen it with my own eyes, and I've heard the stories from others.

By all means, let's continue to gather for worship on the Lord's Day. Let's serve those in need (another key catalyst for spiritual growth). But let us Episcopalians stop finding excuses to avoid reading the Bible. Our denominational allergy to the scriptures is closely related to our continued shrinkage. The good news is that it's easy to fix. Let us open our Bibles. And in that we will find the Good News.

Music is an integral part of the parish life here at St. Matthew's. We sing and play all kinds of music together each week. Musicians of all ages and abilities from the greater community are always welcome and are encouraged to become involved in the musical life of St. Matthew's, regardless of faith or background.

<u>Adult Choir</u> (ages high school and above) leads the music for most principal Sunday services during academic year, with regular participation in Diocesan events and special services, often with choirs from other area churches.

<u>Handbell Choir</u>, (ages middle school or above) plays regularly for principal Sunday services during the academic year, offering a wide range of repertoire and congregational/choral music arranged with handbell accompaniment

<u>Children's Choir</u> (grades 3-8) helps lead worship for Family Worship services throughout the academic year, performing a wide range of music on their own or with the other choirs. They receive instruction aimed to introduce or improve musical abilities (vocal, choral, aural, vocabulary, music theory) and development time management, leadership and cooperative skills. A special camaraderie with fellow choristers is forged through this unique shared experience.

Other Opportunities exist for those who play an instrument are also encouraged to share their gifts, as instrumental music is played before, during and after all 10am Sunday morning services.

- 3:00pm Gospel Concert featuring the Capital City Gospel Singing Group





The greatest among you will be your servant. Matthew 23:11

Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. John 12:26

Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Luke 1:38

The vestry is the legal representative of the parish with regard to all matters pertaining to its corporate property. There are twelve members of the vestry who serve for three years. One third of the vestry is elected every year at the annual parish meeting. The presiding officer of the vestry is the rector. There are usually two wardens. The senior warden leads the parish between rectors and is a support person for the rector. The junior warden is part of the rector-warden team. A treasurer and a secretary or clerk are chosen to help the rector and vestry. These officers may or may not be vestry members. The basic responsibilities of the vestry are to help define and articulate God's mission in and through the congregation; to support the mission by word and deed, to select the rector, to ensure effective organization and planning, and to manage resources and finances. The Vestry meets on the third Monday of each month beginning at 7:30pm.

The wardens duties and mode of selection are determined by state law, diocesan canon, and our parish by-laws. The senior warden is the primary elected lay leader of the congregation, and serves as a principal liaison between the parish and the rector and typically presides at vestry meetings at the request of the rector or in the absence of the rector. (The junior warden presides at vestry meetings if both the rector and the senior warden are absent). In case of clerical vacancy, the senior warden may be the ecclesiastical authority of the parish for certain purposes. Historically, in the Church of England, one warden was named by the priest and the other chosen by the congregation. This is why today, the senior warden is known as the "priest's warden," and the junior warden is known as the "people's warden". Each warden serves for two years, or until a successor is chosen.

The clerk or secretary of the parish vestry records minutes of the vestry meetings and publishes them. These minutes are approved by the vestry and kept in the permanent records of the parish. The clerk is a member of the vestry and is responsible for all official correspondence of the Wardens and Vestry. The Episcopal Church canons require the clerk's attestation for the rector and vestry's certificates of a candidate's fitness for ordination.

The treasurer is responsible for keeping a record of all income and expenditures and rendering reports at each vestry meeting and does not need to be a member of the vestry.

Leadership is About Empowering not Controlling

One of the core tasks of leadership is to empower others to act, it is not to control who acts.

Turf wars seem rampant in our churches and society. "No you can't do that." Is the common refrain as people grasp control, rather than the leaders response: "What do we need to do to empower you to do that?"

One of the last things Jesus did before the ascension was to give away his power to forgive. We have his total backing. Whomever we forgive will be forgiven in heaven... We have been empowered and Jesus has our back.

It is interesting to ponder that Catholics and my own Episcopal tradition want to control that power and limit it to priests, and I hear the Spirit whisper: "Would that you all were in the world forgiving people their sins." I could also digress and say that Protestants also get this wrong by saying only God forgives when Jesus clearly empowered us to be in the world forgiving people.

But I digress and am more interested in the task of leaders giving away their power to empower others. Congregations who are always pondering over who is in control will always have power conflicts, and these conflicts will never be resolved by creating models of governance that describes who is in power. The only way to resolve the issue is to change the fundamental question from:

• Who is in control/power?

to:

• How do we share power to empower people for ministry in our community?

Take a moment and think of who you depend on for your success. (Note: If you are not dependent on others for your success you are not leading anyone.) How do you empower those who you depend on? How do you resource them to fulfill their ministry and the ministry of the community? And: How is it working? If it isn't working you may need to change your empowerment strategy. Different people need different resources to be empowered. Some need a lot of "hands on" empowering, while others need a "hands off" form of empowerment.

Jesus never relied on a "one size fits all" mentality when leading or engaging with others. Likewise, competent leaders need to know their followers and what they specifically need to be empowered to perform at their best. So one of the things you may need to do when giving someone a task is to ask them: "What will you need to be successful?"
